
#### Situation Overview

- Enhanced to moderate risk of severe thunderstorms through this evening.
  - Tornadoes, damaging wind gusts, and large hail are possible.
  - Greatest risk along and north of I-12/I-10 up to Alexandria with the passage of a squall line
  - Additional storms just ahead of this line would have the greatest potential to produce significant, long-track tornadoes, but there is still high uncertainty if and where these storms develop
- Flash flooding ongoing this morning across northwest LA; potential for additional flooding across the state through this evening.
  - Additional rainfall of 1-3" with isolated 5" in a short period of time could produce localized flooding issues.

#### Valid Now Through Tonight






- Enhanced to moderate risk for severe thunderstorms today
- Greatest threats will be damaging winds and tornadoes, but large hail also possible
- Greatest risk from I-10 northward to Alexandria
- Risk is highest this morning across W/N LA, this afternoon across C and SE LA, and this evening across coastal SE LA

6 PM and 10 PM



#### Excessive Rainfall Outlook

#### Today and tonight





- MODERATE risk for Excessive rainfall across northern LA
- SLIGHT risk across central and southern
  LA except MARGINAL along the LA coast
- 3-6" of rainfall and flooding occurred yesterday afternoon into last night across northwest LA, including Shreveport
- Additional rainfall of 1-3" with localized amounts up to 5" possible across central and southern LA today.
- Heavy rainfall could produce localized flooding issues, especially street flooding in low-lying and poor drainage areas
